TOP 30 OF THE GENERAL PERFORMANCE RANKING[©] (GPI Ranking[©])

2019 SEASON, JANUARY

General Performance Index[©]

(GPI: General Performance Index): "It is an index that measures the performance that a tennis player has had in a given period of time." This index, not shown here, is used to make the "General Performance Ranking[©] or GPI Ranking[©]".

This index considers, for its calculation, a series of aspects such as the number of matches played and won, the serves, the points earned with the serves, the returns, the break points (saved and won) and the tiebreaks. Once these indexes are calculated to certain period, January 2019 in this case, these indexes are ordered from highest to lowest and a ranking is established. This ranking is the General Performance Ranking[©] or GPI Ranking[©] that is used to order the players by merit of performance in January, in this case. As already it mentioned in other articles, the WTA Ranking necessarily not should coincide with the General Performance Ranking[©], in fact, rarely happens. This General Performance Ranking[©] is verv useful because it allows analyzing and quantifying what has been the performance of an athlete in relation to the other players that have played in the same period of time.

From our studies, it emerges that the podium in the **GPI Ranking**[©] on January, is formed by **Petra Kvitova** (CZE), **Bianca Andreescu** (CAN) and **Aryna Sabalenka** (BLR). The latter, **Sabalenka**, from Belarus, has been emerging since the last year as one of the candidates with a promising projection and she is holding the **WTA Ranking** 10 at the end of January of this season.

On the other hand, the Czech **Petra Kvitova** is recovering lost ground in recent months, starting this season with the best **GPI Rank-ing**[®]. Kvitova has been the player with the most matches played and, as will be seen later, she has been the absolute leader in all the performance tables that we have prepared in this report.

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The Canadian **Bianca Andreescu** began escorting **Kvitova** at the begin of the season.

Six (6) **Top 10** have reached to belong to the **Top 30** of the January **General Performance Ranking**[©]: **Naomi Osaka** (1), **Petra Kvitova** (2), **Sloane Stephens** (4), **Karolina Pliskova** (5), **Kiki Bertens** (8) and **Aryna Sabalenka** (10). Between brackets, the **WTA Ranking** at the end of January.

The tables with the **General Performance Ranking**[©] or **GPI Ranking**[©] give an idea of the performance of the **TOP 30** in the main aspects such as service, return and break points. For each aspect shown in the tables, the respective **GPI Ranking**[©] has been calculated.

There is an index for each aspect that measures the performance in them, beyond the calculation of the **General Performance Ranking**[©] or **GPI Ranking**[©] that includes all the mentioned aspects (Services, return, break points).

Table 1 shows the General Performance

Ranking[©] of the thirty (30) best players in the tournaments that started in January. Note that, in general, the players with the best **GPI Ranking**[©] are the ones that have played the greatest number of matches. This is because the formulas used to calculate the **General Performance Index**[©] or GPI consider the number of matches played, which implies that if a player has played many matches in a period of time under analysis is because she has had good performance, otherwise, she would have been eliminated in the preliminary rounds. That is to say, given a certain number of tournaments in which a player has participated, the General Performance In**dex**[©] is greater if the player has won as many matches as possible. This comment must be kept in mind when analyzing the tables because there are cases in which a player, in a particular aspect, has a smaller measure than another, but having more matches played the calculation of the index places her in a more advantageous position in the GPI Ranking[©]. We will mention it opportunely.

Table 2 is presenting the Performance of the 1st Service in (%) or Percentage of the 1st Service. Note that the podium of the three (3) best players during the month of January was **Petra Kvitova**, **Aryna Sabalenka** and **Bianca Andreescu**. Practically, these three players have led the **GPI Ranking**[©] of most of the tables presented in this report.

For all the statistical calculations, all the players who participated in the tournaments that started in January have been taken. In total there were 185 players. While this report presents the **Top 30** performance, in the calculations have consider the 185 players. For reasons of space, the **GPI Ranking**[©] has not been shown for the rest, but the results are all relative to the total number of players (185).

I assume that those who read this report are people who understand tennis, so many explanations are not necessary. It is easy to see that those players who in **Table 1** have the best **GPI Ranking**[©] also stand out in the



rankings of the other aspects such as services, return, points earned with serves, etc. Anyway, we will see the evolution month by month to determine the trend of the players. At the end of the season we can quantify the regularity of the players.

It is appropriate to make clear one aspect of the tournaments included in the month under analysis. The criterion adopted have been include in each month the tournaments that start that month, independently they finish the next month. For example, a tournament that begins in month 1 and ends in month 2, is considered within month 1. This is so to allow a player who reaches decisive instances and having matches played in month 1 and in the month 2. Once again, in order not to interrupt the series of matches, the criterion of considering in each month only the matches that begin in that month was adopted. There is the exception of January, which can also include matches from the month of December. There are tournaments in Australia and New Zealand that start at the end of December and finish January of the following year. In this case, as already mentioned, the criterion adopted is to include those matches in the month of January.

Observe, in Table 4, Julia Goerges. This player obtained 74.2% of points won with the first service, however, her performance ranking in this aspect was 14. If we consider this 74.2% in absolute way, **Goerges** should be No. 1 in the ranking of points won with the first service. This is not the case, ranking No. 1 in this category corresponds to **Petra Kvitova** (escorted by **Kiki Bertens** and **Aryna Sabalenka**), who maintained an average of 73.5% of points won with the first service during 16 matches. Julia Goerges held 74.2% for only 8 matches (half of **Kvitova**). As we have already mentioned, the calculation system rewards the performance ranking in the different aspects analyzed considering the number of matches played. The more matches played over a period of time, the greater the performance. It may be that someone wins a match playing poorly or with a low performance, but when many matches are taken, due to a statistical matter, that match is neutralized by another in which the player won playing very well. Someone can

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get up bad one day and play badly but will not always.

It may be the case, and in fact happens, in which a player, in a certain aspect, has a better performance ranking than another, having played fewer matches. In these cases, it is because the player who played the most matches had a much lower average performance than the one who played fewer matches and despite having played more matches her performance does not reach her to compensate for her lower ranking. There are several cases of these in the tables in this report.

Table 7 implicitly reflects the return of services. Those who better return the services of the rivals on average, better percentage of breakpoints won on average will have and, therefore, better ranking in this regard. We observe that, the players that have had better ranking of breaks like **Kvitova**, **Vekic**, **Sabalenka**, **Yastremska**, **Pavlyuchenkova**, **Andreescu**, among others, are the ones that have reached the best ranking in the return of services.
