2019 SEASON, JULY

General Performance Index[®]

(**GPI: General Performance Index**): *"It is an index that measures the performance that a tennis player has had in a given period of time."*

This index, not shown here, is used to make the "**General Performance Ranking[®]** or **GPI Ranking[®]**".

The following tournaments, which correspond to the month of July, have been included for the determination of the **Top 30** of the **General Performance Ranking[®]**:

- **Wimbledon** – Grand Slam (grass).
- **Hall of Fame** – ATP 250 (grass).
- **Swedish Open** – ATP 250 (red clay).
- **Plava Laguna Croatia Open Umag** – ATP 250 (red clay).
- **Hamburg European Open** – ATP 500 (red clay).
- **BB&T Atlanta Open** – ATP 250 (hard, SportMaster).
- **J. Safra Sarasin Swiss Open** – ATP 250 (red clay).
- **Generali Open** – ATP 250 (red clay).
- **Abierto Mexicano de Tenis Mifel** – ATP 250 (hard, Solflex).
- **Citi Open** – ATP 500 (hard, SportMaster).

The **ATP Ranking** of the players, which has been considered for this report, is on August 5th, 2019.

The 184 players who have participated in those 10 tournaments and who compound the statistic sample that has been considered for the statistical calculations, we reiterate, only the 30 with the best performance are exposed in this report.

Remember, performance that is totally independent of the **ATP Ranking**. For example, **Novak Djokovic** (1) and **Roger Federer** (3), whom despite having reached the **Wimbledon** final, they only played this tournament in the period under analysis, which includes 10 tournaments. A player cannot claim to achieve excellent performance in this period, if he has played only one of the ten tournaments, even though he holds No. 1 or 3 of the **ATP Ranking**. This the reason that we calculate the **General Performance Ranking[®]** or **GPI Ranking[®]** to make a performance ranking that highlights the work done by players despite they do not have an outstanding ATP Ranking, but who have performed brilliantly during the analysis period. That is the case of Albert Ramos-Vinolas, whom has been the best player

from the point of view of his performance in this period with his ATP Ranking 52 despite of he has not had the press or marketing that would have corresponded. The tennis fans and the press keep an eye on the **Top 10** or the new stars, but there is a legion of players that from the point of view of the **ATP Ranking** do not stand out (there is an explanation for this) but they have a very good performance (see table 1).

According to table 1, only 4 **Top 10** of the **ATP Ranking** are listed in the **Top 30** of the **GPI Ranking**[®]. These are, **Novak Djokovic** (1), **Roger Federer** (3), **Dominic Thiem** (4) and **Daniil Medvedev** (9). **Rafael Nadal**, who was the best performer player in the second quarterly (see *article No. 89: April-May-June*), in this report No. 91, he is not included in the **Top 30** of **GPI Ranking**[®], his **GPI Ranking**[®] has been 39 in this period of tournaments that began in July.

If someone wins an important tournament and then goes on vacation to the Caribbean or another place, he cannot pretend to have a good performance. My statistical calculation system does not consider if someone is No. 1 of the **ATP Ranking**, if is **Djokovic**, **Federer**, **Nadal**, etc., simply all tournaments have the same importance, and the same happens with the players. Therefore, if someone in the analysis period played 1 of 10 tournaments, no matter if he won it, the performance of the period for that player will consider that he did not play the other 9 tournaments and his performance will be conditioned by that situation. For that reason, **Djokovic** (1) for example, has a **GPI Ranking**[®] of 22 in table 1 and **Ramos-Vinolas** (52) has a **GPI Ranking**[®] 1, who is the best of the period. In parentheses, the **ATP Ranking**, August 5th, 2019.

We highlight the July podium formed by **Albert Ramos-Vinolas** (ESP), **Joao Sousa** (POR)

and **Taylor Fritz** (USA), in positions 1, 2 and 3 of the **GPI Ranking**[®], respectively.

Other prominent players in the **TOP 10** of the **GPI Ranking**[®] are: **Jeremy Chardy** (4), **Andrey Rublev** (5), **Juan Ignacio Londero** (6), **Ugo Humbert** (7), **Roberto Bautista Agut** (8), **Reilly Opelka** (9) and **Guido Pella** (10).

As can be seen, in the previous paragraphs (see Table 1), none of the players that are part of the **Top 10** of the **General Performance Ranking**[®] of the month of July are **Top 10** of the **ATP Ranking**, the same situation happened in the previous month of June. In addition, only 4 **Top 10** of the **ATP Ranking** are included in the **Top 30** of the **GPI Ranking**[®], namely **Dominic Thiem** (19), **Novak Djokovic** (22), **Daniil Medvedev** (23) and **Roger Federer** (24). Moreover, only 13 players **Top 30** of the **ATP Ranking** are included in the **Top 30** of the **GPI Ranking**[®] (See table 2 for verification).

It is interesting to take a look at table 3, where the relationship of the won matches over the total played matches in the 10 tournaments covered in this report are exposed. This table 3 is led by **Novak Djokovic**, with a ratio of 100% of won matches over total played matches (7/7). He is followed by **Nick Kyrgios** (87.5%) and **Roger Federer** (85.7%). In this table 4, only 4 **Top 10** of the **ATP Ranking** are listed, and they are the same that were mentioned above in table 2.

Next, the tables with their respective performance rankings or **GPI Ranking**[®] are exposed as is usual, in each analyzed aspect of the 30 players that achieved the highest performances during the analysis period.

Remember, each table presented here has its own **GPI Ranking**[®], which they are combined together and gives as output the table 1.
